

THE COLLEGE SEAL

The seal of Montreat-Anderson College is composed of concentric circles surrounding the open book of learning and the Word of God. The words "Montreat-Anderson College" encompass the ideals of strength, beauty, and truth above the Latin motto meaning "to be rather than to seem." The date of the founding of the college, 1916, completes the emblem.



THE MACE AND THE BANNER

The College mace symbolizes the authority of the President and is present in all official College convocations. The Montreat-Anderson mace is of walnut and silver, representing the simplicity and strength of the Cross of Christ, the open Bible, and the lamp of knowledge, transcendent over the seal of the College. The Celtic cross, the open Bible, and the word TRUTH on the College banner represent the focus of Montreat-Anderson College.

Doctor of Humane Letters William (Billy) Franklin Graham

The man we recognize today with Montreat-Anderson College's first Honorary Degree is listed regularly by the Gallup Poll Organization as one of the "Ten Most Admired Men in the World," a recognition he has received thirtythree times in forty years, making him the dominant figure in that poll. He has been in the top ten in the Good Housekeeping Most Admired Men Poll all ten years of its existence, and for the fourth year he has had the honor of being selected number two by the respondents. He has appeared on the covers of Time Magazine, Newsweek, Life, U.S. News and World Report, Parade, Look, and numerous other publications. His counsel has been sought by presidents, and in 1983 he received the nation's highest civilian award, The Presidential Medal of Freedom.

William Franklin Graham was born November 7, 1918, in Charlotte, North Carolina on a dairy farm. Known throughout the world as Billy Graham, he has had a fruitful and illustrious career as an evangelist. He is held in such high esteem that his awards and honors cover two pages in his biography. He has written fifteen books, all of which have become top sellers. One of his early books, Peace With God, has sold over two million copies in thirty-eight languages. Three of his books have been on the New York Times Best Seller list. His syndicated newspaper column, "My Answer," is carried by newspapers across the country, reaching five million readers. He has received numerous honorary degrees.

Mr. Graham founded the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association in 1950. In a world-wide ministry of more than forty years, he has preached the Gospel in person to more than 110 million people in every state and in 84 countries around the world. Other facets of Mr. Graham's ministry include television specials, World Wide Pictures, *Decision* magazine, and the weekly radio program, "Hour of Decision."

Mr. Graham was graduated from Florida Bible Institute (now Trinity College) in 1940 and received an A. B. degree from Wheaton College in Illinois in 1943. It was at Wheaton College that he met Ruth Bell, daughter of Presbyterian missionaries to China, and they were married in Gaither Chapel in 1943. They have five children - Virginia, Anne, Ruth, Franklin, and Nelson - 19 grandchildren, and 3 great-grandchildren.

To those of us in Montreat, Dr. Graham is known simply as "Billy," thoughtful neighbor, kind friend, and interested citizen. Robert Louis Stevenson said, "To be a gentleman is to be one in every relation and grade of society." Billy Graham is such a gentleman. A gracious and unassuming man, he is equally at home in the White House or Buckingham Palace and in the modest homes of this community. Accustomed to recognition and much sought after by many groups and famous persons, he is gracious in responding to requests from Montreat-Anderson College and has on several occasions sacrificed his times of retreat and renewal to lend his name and presence,

formally and informally, on behalf of the college, on occasion giving public endorsements. There have been times when I knew that requests for his support came as an added burden to him, but for the good of the college, I have, somewhat reluctantly, made these requests. In every instance he has been gracious and generous, responding in an unselfish and kindly way, giving visible and invisible support as his schedule and strength permitted, never making us feel it was an imposition.

Throughout his entire career, Billy Graham has remained loyal, genuine, and honorable. In James 3:17 it reads: "But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, without uncertainty or insincerity." Those words describe Billy Graham.

Today, at age 72, Billy Graham is at the height of his ministry. In his own words, he states, "My one purpose in life is to help people find a personal relationship with God, which, I believe, comes from knowing Christ."

For a commitment to preaching the Gospel throughout the world and for a lifetime of dedicated and unselfish service to others, it is with great pleasure and pride that Montreat-Anderson College presents to the Rev. Mr. William Franklin Graham its first Honorary Degree, the Doctor of Humane Letters.

Distinguished Service Award Lonnie Allen Morris

"Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom." Those words from the third chapter of James speak to the character of the man we honor today with a Distinguished Service Award, L. Allen Morris of Coral Gables, Florida.

God has prospered Allen Morris, and by all standards of measurement, he has had a successful life. Samuel Butler wrote, "Every man's work . . . is always a portrait of himself." Certainly this is true of Allen Morris. A realtor since 1947, he was the founder of The Allen Morris Company and today serves as Chairman of its Board of Directors. Mr. Morris is eminently qualified in the real estate investment and business managment fields and is an officer and director of more than twenty real estate corporations.

Mr. Morris' life has been an Horatio Alger story. He worked his way through college at Georgia Tech during the depression years. At the same time, he was an honor student, Editor of the school newspaper, Treasurer of the Student Body, Co-captain of the National Championship Rifle Team, a member of the Georgia Tech Athletic Board, and was elected to membership in Omicron Delta Kappa, the ANAK Society, Scabbard and Blade, and Pi Delta Epsilon. He was also a member of Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity.

Mr. Morris entered active duty in the Navy in 1941 as an Ensign and rose rapidly through the ranks during his five years of service, retiring from the Naval Reserve in 1962 with the rank of Captain. In World War II he served on the staff of Admiral William Allen and Vice Admiral William Glassford in Africa, France, England, and the Mediterranean. As Secretary of the American Mission to Dakar, he was awarded a special commendation by the Secretary of the Navy.

After World War II, Mr. Morris returned to Atlanta and became National Advertising Manager of Scripto Pens and Pencils. He was active in Community Chest, the Red Cross, and continued his interest in Boy Scouts which had previously culminated in his becoming an Eagle Scout at age 15. Since 1947 he has been a highly successful Miami Realtor, exhibiting the same engergy and purpose he had demonstrated as a student.

Allen Morris has received wide professional

dustrial and Office Realtors, the American Society of Appraisers, the Society of Residential Appraisers, the National Institute of Farm and Land Brokers, the Urban Land Institute, and the Mortgage Bankers Association. He is a Certified Residential Broker, a Certified Commercial Investment Member of the Realtors National Marketing Institute, and a Certified Property Manager of the Institute of Real Estate Management.

Among the professional honors which Mr. Morris has received are the National Association of Realtors Distinguished Service Award and Life Membership on the Board of Directors of the National Association. He is also a Life Member of the Florida Association of Realtors and the Miami Board of Realtors, where he has served as an officer and director. He is a former President and Life Member of the Realtors National Marketing Institute. He has edited and sponsored several publications on real estate and has addressed conventions and seminars in thirty-three states and several foreign countries. As Chaplain of the National Association in 1970, he inaugurated the first annual prayer breakfast at the Association's Convention in Miami Beach, and the breakfast has continued to be a Sunday morning feature for more than twenty years.

Allen Morrris has been active in many civic, educational and religious organizations. He has served as a Governor of the American Red Cross, President of the Orange Bowl Committee, a Founder and Director of Goodwill Industries of Miami, a member of the South Florida Council of the Boy Scouts of America, a President of the Florida Young Presidents' Organization, and of the Miami chapter of the Georgia Tech Alumni Association. He is a Rotarian and was a Founder Trustee of Florida Presbyterian College, now Eckerd College. He served as a member of the Florida Council of 100, the Museum of Science, the Crippled Children's Society, Director of the Miami Children's Hospital and of the Doctors Hospital in Coral Gables.

Mr. Morris is an active Presbyterian layman who has served his church and Christian causes in many ways. His is an Elder Emeritus in the Granada Presbyterian Church in Coral Gables, a Director Emeritus of Campus Crusade for Christ International, a Trustee of Reformed Theological Seminary, a Director

Mr. Morris is a devoted family man. He is married to the former Ida Akers, a charming and attractive woman who has been his loyal helpmate for more than fifty years. Allen says his greatest accomplishment was their marriage. They have three children - W. Allen Morris of Coral Gables, Ida Bell of Atlanta, and Kay Rupp of Coral Gables. They have nine grandchildren.

Allen Morris is a charming, disarming man with extraordinary mentality and a fine mind. He is affable with a sense of humor and a keen interest in people. He is a philanthropist who has given generously to Christian causes. He and his wife Ida have always been active in and supportive of Evangelical and Evangelistic work. Now in its 36th year, the Allen Morris Foundation which they established continually serves Christ through its support of Christian missionaries throughout the world, Christ-centered institutions such as Montreat-Anderson College, and the Christian Executive Ministry in Miami, which was started by and continues to be operated by their son.

Allen Morris has contributed in a major way to the advancement of education at Montreat-Anderson College. His gifts have helped to undergird this institution, and as a Trustee and Chairman of the Board, he exemplified the model trustee in many ways. Ever loyal and committed to the purpose of the college, his support was always evident. He served as a Trustee from 1972 to 1988, and was Chairman of the Board from 1986 to 1988. During his tenure as Chairman, the college was accredited as a Four-Year Institution that awards bachelor degrees. In the fall of his first year as Chairman, the first Junior Class in nearly thirty years was enrolled, and in 1988, the first group in nearly thirty years was graduated with Baccalaureate degrees.

A coin represents service, but unless it is spent, it accomplishes nothing. Like a shiny coin that has a special sheen from much use, the life of Allen Morris reflects a shining example of unselfish service.

For a lifetime of dedicated and unselfish service to others and for numerous contributions to Christian causes and especially Christian higher education, it is with great pleasure and pride that Montreat-Anderson College presents to Lonnie Allen Morris The

Distinguished Service Award Catherine Stewart Vaughn

For nineteen years, Catherine Stewart Vaughn has stood beside her husband as the "first lady" of Montreat-Anderson College. Through the use of her many talents, she has perfectly complemented the tenure of Si Vaughn as president of this institution. On countless occasions, Mrs. Vaughn has hosted visiting dignitaries, alumni, trustees, advisory boards, faculty, staff, parents, students, and friends of the college; welcoming each with the same graciousness and hospitality, be they a high church official or a nervous freshman on the first day of school. Each has been instantly put at ease in her presence.

A fine example of a Christian wife, mother, and grandmother, Cathy has always put the highest priority on family life. She is justly proud of the accomplishments of her and Si's sons, Stewart and Andrew; daughter-in-law Laura; grandsons Christopher and Matthew; and soon-to-be daughter-in-law Amy. She is a personification of Proverbs 30:10-31, which reads in part:

Who can find a virtuous wife? For her worth is far above rubies. The heart of her husband safely trusts her; . . . She does him good and not evil all the days of her life. . . . Her children rise up and call her blessed; . . . a woman who fears the Lord, she shall be praised . . .

Cathy holds an A. B. degree from Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro). Active in its Alumni Association, she served as National President from 1986-88. In May 1991, she received the prestegious Alumni Distinguished Service Award.

To elaborate on Mrs. Vaughn's activities, through the local church, presbytery, synod and General Assembly, would require a booklet of some proportions. A few highlights include present service as Chair of the Task Force on New Church Development for Presbytery of Western North Carolina and past service as Co-Moderator, Joint National Executive Committee of United Presbyterian Women/Women of the Church Committee meetings, 1986-88; Vice Chair, Women of the Church Committee 1985-86; member of Synod of North Carolina Boundaries Committee (now Synod of the Mid-Atlantic); Chair, Synod's Ministry Group on Women, 1984-86; Director/Chairperson of Planning for Synod's Leadership Development Conference, 1982; and Director of North Carolina Presbyterian Women's Conference, 1984. She has held offices at every church level and represented the Women of the Church on Journey to China in 1987.

Mrs. Vaughn's recognition as a leader within the Presbyterian Church was acknowledged by her peers in her election to the highest office in Presbyterian women, that of Chair, Women of the Church Committee, at the General Assembly level, from 1986-88.

Cathy has been an involved citizen of her community. Among her many actives have been service on the Executive Committee, Asheville/Buncombe Local Government Study Commission; PTA President; Garden Club President; Board of Directors, North Carolina Museum of History Associates; and Secretary, Buncombe County Grand Jury in 1990.

Her pursuit of excellence in everything she does is an example to all who know Cathy Vaughn. She is a noted speaker and workshop leader, appearing before both church and civic groups. Honors and awards include a Fulbright Grant to Cairo, Eqypt, 1952-54, where she met and married Si. She received one of the first two Honorary Life Memberships in Presbyterian Women in July 1988.

She also received Honorary Life Memberships in the Women of the Church, Asheville Presbytery, and the Garden Clubs of North Carolina. Cathy is an Honorary Member of Delta Kappa Gamma, teachers' sorority, and taught several years at the secondary level.

This lady of multiple talents has enough interests and hobbies to make a less energetic person tremble. Along with her husband, she has had a great desire to bring international students to Montreat-Anderson College and make them welcome and comfortable. A lover of travel, she leads trips abroad, having visited approximately fifty countries. Her interests also include photography, designing and completing her own needlepoint canvases, reading, bridge, wildflowers and birds, writing, cooking and entertaining, and refinishing old furniture.

Montreat-Anderson College is privileged to present to her the Distinguished Service Award in recognition of devoted leadership in the Church; involvement in communities where she has lived; and belief in and support of Christian education, in particular through a commitment to Montreat-Anderson College.

Doctor of Laws Charles Edward Cauthen, Jr.

We honor today, as the recipient of an Honorary Degree from Montreat-Anderson College, a man who has had a long and distinguished career. For a number of years, he was recognized as a leader in the retail food industry and has been listed in *Outstanding Young Men of America*, 1965; *Who's Who in Finance and Industry*, 1972-73; *Who's Who in South and Southwest*, 1984-85; and *Who's Who in the World*, 1987-1988.

Born in Columbia, South Carolina, on October 26, 1931, Charles Edward Cauthen, Jr., graduated in 1952 with a B. A. degreee from Wofford College, where his father was a Professor of History. He also completed the Graduate Program in Hospital Administration at the Charlotte Memorial Medical Center in 1957.

Following graduation from college, Mr. Cauthen served in the U.S. Army, including combat service in Korea. In 1958, he became Assistant Administrator, Union Memorial Hospital, Monroe, North Carolina and then was Administrator of Lowrance Hospital in Mooresville, North Carolina. He began his career in the retail food industry as Vice President of Virginia Acme Market, Inc., in Bluefield, in 1961. He was Vice President of Acme Markets and A Mart Department Stores (now Acme Markets of Tazewell, Virginia, Inc.) from 1961-1971 and President from 1971 to 1987; President of Big A Warehouse, Inc., 1981-1987; and President of Acme Markets of Tazewell, Virginia, Inc. from January 1987 to September 1987. He was also Director and President of Doran Development Corporation, 1971-87, which

included operation of twelve retail food and department stores, a food distribution center, and various real estate and development activities.

Mr. Cauthen served as a trustee of King College, Bristol, Tennessee, from 1983-1987 and as Chairman of the Development Committee for three of those years. In 1987, he made an important career change and became Provost at King. The Board of Trustees elected him President of the college in 1989. He is providing capable and wise leadership in the crucial decade of the nineties.

Mr. Cauthen served as a Deacon, Elder, and Trustee in the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Bluefield, and since 1988, has been active in the First Presbyterian Church of Bristol. He was a member of the board of the Covenant Fellowship of Presbyterians (Presbyterian Church, U.S.), 1982-85. With a keen interest in missions, Charles was a member of a Mission Team to Uganda, East Africa, in 1984, with Global Outreach.

A strong believer in family life, a faithful husband and father, Charles has been married to the former Hazel Electa Peery since 1959. She has been his strongest supporter in all of his endeavors. The Cauthens are the proud parents of four daughters. Portia is the wife of Richard White, associate minister of the Montreat Presbyterian Church, and they have three children. Rachel and her husband, James Philip Rohrer, a Chemical Engineer, have one daughter; Sara is a Store Manager for Cignal Company in California; and Sidney, the youngest, is a student at King College.

Mr. Cauthen's book, Evaluation of the

Small Company for Strategic Planning, Merger or Acquisition, was published by Commonwealth Press in 1987. He has also had articles in Southern Hospitals, The Presbyterian Layman, and Global Outreach Newsletter.

The list of offices held is quite extensive and includes directorates of Bluefield Supply Company, the Bank of Tazewell County, Tazewell Free Press, Virginia Food Dealers Association, Rotary Club, Citizens Bank of Tazewell, and Channel 40, Inc., to mention a few. He has also served on the Operators Executive Council of the Food Marketing Institute and as Director and Vice President of the West Virginia Association of Retail Grocers. He was a Director and President of the Bluefield Union Mission. Mr. Cauthen has been on the Advisory Board of Bluefield College; Council of Associates, Wofford College; and is presently a member of the President's Council of Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary.

A committed Christian, Charles would agree with Paul's words in Romans 1:16-17, which reads in part "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ,... For in it the righteousness of God is revealed; as it is written, 'The just shall live by faith'."

For his distinguished career as a Christian businessman and his commitment to Christian higher education, it is with great pleasure and pride that Montreat-Anderson College presents to Charles Edward Cauthen, Jr., the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws.
