Jesus, We Love To Meet

THE author of these words, Mrs. Elizabeth Rooker Parson, was the daughter of a Congregational minister, Rev. William Rooker, of Tavistock, Devonshire, England. This minister had the rather unusual experience of serving one Parish for nearly fifty years. His daughter, before her marriage, conducted a class for young men and young women in the Vestry of her father's Chapel on Sunday evenings. It was called the "Willing Class" because those who came, came "willingly." It was for this class she wrote several hymns—the young people being the inspiration for such verses. Eventually eighteen of the hymns were published for private distribution by a loyal member of the group. Her hymns were often written for special services like "New Year's," "Passiontide," "Missions" and "Dedication of the Life to Christ." This illustration given was called "Sunday" by the author. Ultimately these and other verses from her pen found place in various Collections.

Of the composer of the music, which is so wholly suited to the text, no trace can be found. He has united to the flowing melodic line, always to be sung in unison, a very simple and beautiful harmonic background treated in a musicianly manner.


THE writer of this well-beloved hymn (found on the last page), "O Master, Let Me Walk with Thee," was Washington Gladden, who was born in Pottsgrove, Pennsylvania, in 1836. He graduated from Williams College, Massachusetts, in 1859, later entering the Congregational Denomination and serving parishes in Brooklyn and Morrisania, New York, North Adams and Springfield, Massachusetts, finally moving to Columbus, Ohio, where he ministered for thirty-two years as Pastor and Pastor Emeritus of the First Congregationalist Church.

A man of wide reading and of practical turn of mind, he was also fearless in acting upon his convictions. He had the respect and confidence of those who differed with his views. He felt that the present social order could be Christianized by the application of the fundamental Christian principle, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."


This hymn is peculiarly fitted for the devotional hour or for quiet meditation and aspiration, a true dedication to service. It has well been designated a "Prayer Hymn" and should be played and sung in a quiet and reverent manner with a true feeling for its spiritual significance.

The tune, "Maryton," was written by a clergyman of the Church of England, Canon Henry Percy Smith, and was first published in 1874, the words, "Sun of My Soul, Thou Saviour Dear," being used with it at that time. This tune, "Maryton," has now come to be wholly associated with Dr. Gladden's stanzas.
