### How is the Daily Class Period Conducted?

The entire forenoon from 9:00 to 12:30 is given over to the consideration of the imperative needs of teacher and pupil in the discussion, illustration and interpretation of the choicest music literature gleaned from all countries, the names, composers and publishers of which are handed to members of the class in the form of typed lists, classified for each grade from the very first work at the piano, on to and including the artist's material.
